

Adolphus Burton 1916 - 1995

The Burton family moved from Adolphus's birthplace, Trail, to Cranbrook before his first birthday. His father Bill became a well- known Cranbrook citizen contributing to the community in many ways as a band leader, library board member, founding the Cranbrook historical society, and serving as an alderman from 1951 to 1955. He worked for the Courier newspaper for ten years where he honed his skills as a photographer. The musically artistic side of his father translated into the visually artistic side of Adolphus, (Duffy). After serving in the Airforce, Adolphus worked as a commercial artist in his own sign shop for many years before he returned to Cranbrook in 1985, after forty years away. His goal at this time was to record on canvas, as many of Cranbrook important old timers, who were born before 1900, as he could.



This project became an obsession and photographs were frequently supplied to him to aid in the work he was doing. While a resident himself in the FW Green Home he painted many of the residents. Adolphus Burton died in 1995. In 2013, some of his paintings, those adorning the walls of the FW Green Home, were repatriated to their families after a local advertising campaign and with the help of Dave Humphrey, local historian. In one of his press interviews during his retirement in Cranbrook, Duffy indicated he hoped his collection would eventually make its way to a museum. A collection of ninety nine paintings was donated to the Cranbrook History Centre by Skip Fennessy in 2017. Skip Fennessy was a good friend of Adolphus Burton and at Duffy's request he gathered up the paintings still in Adolphus' possession at the time of his death. He subsequently granted Adolphus's wish to see them kept

in perpetuity in a museum. Sixty five of these paintings are in this

exhibition including some which are unnamed.
